Attracting birds to your garden

AUSTRALIA has some wonderful native birdlife and there are many ways to encourage our feathered friends into our gardens.

By choosing your plants carefully you can often bring the birds into your garden and their sounds, songs and colour add life to many gardens, as well as bringing a little piece of nature to our own back

Trees and shrubs in your garden not only provide food for the birds but also shelter for nesting, especially plants with prickly foliage.

Plant selection

Some trees and shrubs which are attractive to birds include the following:

Eucalypts: These trees often have hollows in their trunk or in branch forks which provide shelter and nesting sites for many birds. Ranksias: Most hank found to be attractive to birdlife especially to honeyeaters. There

are banksias that will grow in most parts of Australia. Grevilleas: Many species of grevilleas are highly attractive to birds because of the nectar
